Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the ninth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Lakemont Elementary School serves 601 students enrolled in Kindergarten through fifth grades. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 41% Hispanic and 59% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 72% White, 16% Black, 0% Native American, 4% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 8% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Karl Fox and Assistant Principal Amanda Stewart. Lakemont Elementary School is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include the National Elementary Honor Society, Sunshine State Book Club, Kiwanis Kids Club, Battle of the Books Team, WLOS News Crew, Gardening Club, Chorus, ORFF Ensemble, Environmental Team, and Orchestra (Strings).

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Lakemont Elementary School indicates that the average age of the collection is 2008 and the number of books per student is 21. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for a highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Lakemont Elementary School meets the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection and the student achievement data also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Forty-one percent of students at Lakemont Elementary School are Hispanic and the amount of Spanish books in our collection should increase to support students who are Spanish-speaking.
- Grade 4 FSA ELA scores increased significantly, while grades 3 and 5 FSA ELA scores decreased.
- FSA Math scores increased in grades 3 5, while Grade 5 NGSSS Science Scores stayed the same.
- There are only 387 books in the Lexile categories BR-199 and 200-349

- Science and Technology sections are below the recommended average age and need to include updated books representing more recent information.
- Language, Social Sciences, Religion, Philosophy & Psychology, Literature, and History & Geography sections are significantly below the recommended average age and the books in these sections need to be updated.
- The section of Easy books is the recommended average age, so more books should be purchased in this category.

Representation Analysis

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of Lakemont Elementary School in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:
